Social Justice Committee Supports Nature Conservancy Patty Buehler

For forty years The Nature Conservancy has conserved wild places and wildlife in Wisconsin and around the world. Their major project areas in Wisconsin include the Baraboo Hills in Sauk County, the Door Peninsula, and the Chequamegon Bay Watershed on Lake Superior. The Social Justice Committee has donated \$100 to the Wisconsin Chapter. The Chapter points out that we can make a donation to help Wisconsin's endangered resources on our Wisconsin Tax Return. Every dollar we donate is matched by the State. In their latest newsletter, the Nature Conservancy suggests "another important source of income for the protection of rare species in our state is the Endangered Resources License Plate. Your \$25 annual fee for the plate, which features the timber wolf, is a donation to the Bureau of Endangered Resources, which protects endangered species and rare habitats. If you care, let it show! NUU Views

Question; In her recent sermon, Sister Ann Whitman provided a different view of the Lord's Prayer suggesting that what comes to us through the Greek translation in the King James Version as

"...Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil..." Seems very different when translated directly from the Aramaic in which it was written. "...Grant what we need each day in bread and insight. Loose the cords of mistakes binding us, as we release the strands we hold of others' guilt. Don't let surface things delude us, but free us from what holds us back..." How do you compare the two translations with respect to their meaning to Unitarian Universalists?

Answer from Dick Fields:

The Lord's Prayer bonds Christians of all faiths and is the only prayer attributed to Jesus Christ. Being raised a Methodist the Lord's Prayer was a familiar part of each Sunday service.

I no longer feel comfortable reciting the Lord's Prayer when visiting Christian Churches, possibly due to the initial word which starts out "Our Father who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven." Rather than reciting words that no longer have meaning to me I remain silent.

The Newsletter Editor's question does not address the glorification of God, but is directed toward the request for divine assistance to mankind. Of the two versions the King James version is more specific regarding our physical needs, more concise regarding "forgiveness of our debts as we forgive our debtors" and is simplistic in branding us as followers.

I prefer the Aramaic translation and I believe many humanists and UU's would also as it places more responsibility on the individual and society to achieve mutual goals and not on a Supreme Being.

Answer from Terry Hoyt:

Being an attorney who has used language as a means to make a living for almost thirty years I have never been trusting of the "literal" interpretation of the Word. I know that the same words have different meanings to each user and that certainly over the years that translations have come to reflect the interpretations of those words by the translators and their beliefs.

I don't see a great deal of difference between the two translations as I interpret what they are saying. I can't speak for Unitarian Universalists on this one, but my own interpretation of the meaning of these words has been as follows: "Give us this day our daily bread" --as we live this day one day at a time help us to have those things that we need; "And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors,"--another way of expressing the Golden Rule; "And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil,"--help keep us on the right path, the path of doing good.

I'm afraid I'm suspicious of any translation that is trying to exactly interpret the subtleties of a language that is over two thousand years old, but it certainly makes for interesting discussion. •
