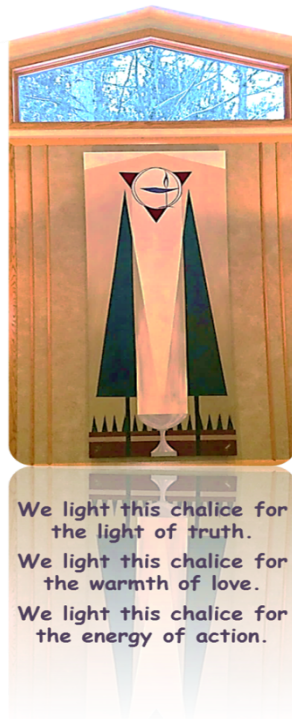

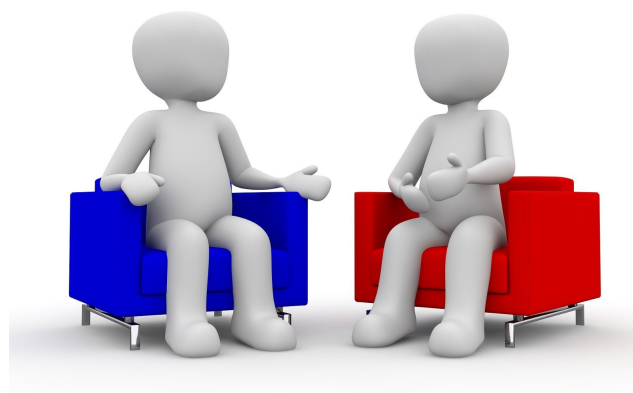
Men's Discussion Group meets on Tuesday, April 9, at 6 p.m. at the Fellowship

● COMMUNITY DINNERS

Our Fellowship was instrumental in getting the once a month community dinners started about 10 years ago. Lee Ann Niebuhr, Father Edgar from St. Mathias, and Woody Haage brought the idea to the Lakeland Ministerial Association where a plan was developed. Eventually having the dinners at St. Mathias was approved and the various churches in the area divided up the responsibility of providing a dinner to anyone that wanted to share some time with others in the community. These dinners are held on the third Tuesday of each month with dinner being served at 5 p.m.

Pat Bickner organized these dinners for us for many years and then Joan Junge took over the responsibility. Many thanks to Joan and Pat for doing this service. The Hospitality Committee has now taken on the job of reminding our members that we can help bring our community together by sharing some food four times a year. Our Fellowship provides food in January, April, July, and October. There are usually 70 to 100 attendees at these dinners. Our Fellowship should provide about

eight potluck size entrees for the dinner and have some volunteers to help serving and cleanup.

Please mark your calendar so that you can help this worthwhile project. It's a very enjoyable experience to share food with others.

The Film: "Chocolat." Approx. 2 hrs 2 min. 2000. A magical and delicious tale from director Lasse Hallstrom is set in a small French village in 1959 where a single mother arrives with her daughter and opens a chocolate shop whose confections have an intoxicating and liberating effect on the townspeople, until the iron-willed mayor tries to shut her down. And, an Irish river gypsy arrives in town and is seduced by her sweet spell.

- **"Doing Theology in the Age of Trump: A Critical Report on Christian Nationalism (Westar Seminar on God and the Human Future),"** by Dr. Jeffrey W. Robbins (Editor), Clayton Crockett (Editor), November 8, 2018

This book is a work of theological resistance. It is not so much about the presidency of Donald Trump as it is about what his popularity and rise to power reveal about the state of Christianity and the moral character of the evangelical Right in the United States today. More specifically, it is about the threat of white Christian nationalism, which is the particular form that the nationalist populist movement of Trumpism has adopted for itself. The contributors are all fellows from the Westar Institute academic seminar on God and the Human Future, and include many of the leading figures in theology and Continental philosophy of religion. This volume provides a form of theopolitical resistance based on intersectionality. The authors (16) recognize how the various forms of oppression interrelate to contribute to a vast, dynamic, and seeming impenetrable network of systemic injustice and marginalization. These essays demonstrate that politics need not be played as a zero-sum game with a winner-take-all mentality, and that a critical theology is as urgently needed and as relevant now as ever.

Spokane

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.

GA will offer more than 100 programming selections over the course of five days. This year, in addition to Theme-Based Programming, the schedule will feature Role-Based Track Programming, including time for discussion among attendees, sharing inspiring models and stories, and concrete suggestions for how to further the work or "take it home." WHAT IS Youth MidWest Leadership School?

Youth Midwest Leadership School is a weeklong intensive experience designed to engage participants in all aspects of leadership in a Unitarian Universalist faith community. Since 2009, we have offered Youth Midwest Leadership School for teens (entering 9-12 grade) in tandem with our Adult School on the Luther College Campus. It will challenge and train Unitarian Universalist youth in three areas: Leadership Skills Development, Worship, and Religious Values & Heritage.

This Leadership School is an intentional community and learning experience. It equips young UUs with a foundation that deepens their religious development and expands their ability to contribute, both in their Unitarian Universalist community and beyond.

WHO Should Attend?

Students should be motivated to learn and engage. They should be able to manage their time and needs in an environment with long days filled with group and individual learning opportunities along with theological reflection. They need to be mature and emotionally stable. Youth entering grades 9- 12 may attend; youth entering grades 10-11 are especially encouraged. Congregations sending adult students would especially benefit from sending youth!
