Possible Book Discussion Group

A couple years ago several of us met to discuss retired Bishop John Shelby Sponge's book, *Rescuing the Bible from Fundamentalism*. Attendance ranged from eight, which I anticipated, up to eighteen, which surprised me. Recently I read, and then re-read *Who Wrote the Bible* by Richard Friedman of the U. of California, San Diego.

The title is a tad misleading since the book focuses on who really write the Pentateuch, or the five books of Moses. The text contains both history and mystery and some insight into Biblical scholarship through the centuries.

As long as a thousand years ago, Jewish scholars began to cast doubt on the notion that Moses actually penned the first five books of the Bible, particularly since on book contains an account of Moses's death, but it took literally centuries before scholars weren't severely punished for proposing such a then radical idea. Among other things, Friedman traces the history of such dissent.

Single-payer national health insurance is system in which a single public or quasi-public agency organizes health financing, but delivery of care remains largely private yet inadequate, despite spending more than twice as much per capita as the rest of the industrialized nations,

Place Stamp Here

The United States performs poorly comparison on major health indicators such as life expectancy, infant mortality and immunization rates. Moreover, the other advanced nations provide comprehensive coverage to their entire populations, while the U.S. leaves 45.7 million completely uninsured and millions more inadequately covered.

The reason we spend more and get less is because we have a patchwork system of more than 1,200 for-profit health insurance companies. Private insurers necessarily waste health dollars on things that have nothing to do with care: overhead, underwriting, billing, sales and marketing departments as well as huge profits and exorbitant executive pay. Doctors and hospitals must maintain costly administrative staffs to deal with insurance company bureaucracies. Combined, this administration consumes more than \$350 billion per year, one-third (31 percent) of Americans' health dollars. Eliminating these needless costs would free up enough money so everyone could have full health care.
