Message from the President

So, how do you celebrate the "holidays"? How do you find meaning in this pseudo-Christian, commercialized extravaganza we call Christmas? If ever there was a time of year requiring the search for truth and meaning, this is surely it. Such a complicated holiday: Christianity layered on top of Saturnalia and winter solstice celebrations. Mix in a little Hanukah, a bit of Kwanzaa and it's hard to know what you're left with. How can any of us make sense of it? I suspect that even those of among us who consider themselves Christian find the "American Way" of celebrating difficult to reconcile with a humble birth of a special child. When in doubt, I often turn to Calvin and Hobbes. Here's what Calvin has to say about this, "Yep, Christmas is just around the corner. And what better way to celebrate a religious holiday than with a month of frenzied consumerism." Hobbes weighs in, "I'm surprised other religions haven't picked up on that." Back to Calvin, "Getting loads of loot is a very spiritual experience for me." Well, to each his own...

Serious, for many of us, the sights, the sounds, the tastes, the smells, the music, all bring to mind vivid memories of holidays past. In a word: Traditions. We may not understand why the traditions are important, but we know they are. In the prologue to "A Fiddler on the Roof", Tevye explains, "A fiddler on the roof. Sounds crazy, no? But in our little village of Anatevka, you might say every one of us is a fiddler on the roof, trying to scratch out a pleasant, simple tune without breaking his neck. It isn't easy. You may ask, why do we stay up there if it's so dangerous? We stay because Anatevka is our home... And how do we keep our balance? That I can tell you in one word... Tradition." Sophia Lyon Fahs wrote: "Each night a child is born is a special night; a time for singing, a time for wondering, a time for worshiping. Each night a child is born is a holy night."

We happen to call it Christmas because that's more culturally understandable, but we really are acknowledging the ancient reverence for the earth and the changing of the seasons. We really cherish that 10 day break in our busy schedules between Christmas and New Year's to reflect on the year past and the one upcoming and to recharge our batteries. It's a wonderful time of year to reconnect with our natural world. The sun seems to stand still, and for just a little while, so do we

And Paul, well, he just goes around muttering, "Bah Humbug!", but is always the first one to come to a holiday party. There is no season for community and fellowship. Or a good fish fry.

However you celebrate or don't this time of year, I hope you find truth and meaning in the company of family and friends. —Elinore

Lakeland Food Pantry

We have had a busy year at the Food Pantry and are grateful for the many volunteers who help us out. At our last Operating Committee Meeting we discussed the need to develop additional cleaning crews. We currently clean the pantry once a week, usually on Wednesdays. A crew of five relatively able-bodied people can clean it in approximately one hour. This involves vacuuming all the carpets, sweeping and mopping the hard surface floors, cleaning two bathrooms, cleaning the kitchen, emptying the waste baskets, cleaning freezers and refrigerators as needed, and wiping down door knobs, table tops etc.

We have been asked by the pantry if NUUF would be willing to provide a cleaning crew and if so how many times per year would we be willing to clean. If each church provides one crew, we are looking at about six times per year.

Our next day to help staff the pantry for distribution is February 1, 2011. Donations of non-perishable food items and personal hygiene items are always welcome. Northwoods Homeless Need Our Help

At the retreat held on November 13, NUUF members identified NATH (Northwoods Alliance for Temporary Housing) as an organization we are enthusiastic about supporting. NATH will provide shelter for the homeless in Oneida, Forest, Langlade, Lincoln, and Vilas counties. Jana Mirs, Patty Buehler, and Barba Beutler volunteered at the retreat to visit the NATH house in Rhinelander, to arrange a presentation to the fellowship by a representative of NATH and to make recommendations to the Social Justice Committee as to how we may support NATH.

Joyce Barnes, Sally Back, Diane Reupert, Dan Rondello and Charmaine Winters had become involved with volunteering or attending meetings at NATH, but no official support from NUUF had been established.

The presentation by Carol Miller, the NATH representative, was filled with passion, and those in attendance responded positively. There were still a few rooms to adopt at the NATH house, work to be done by volunteers, donations of money needed and the potential for a great social action project that the fellowship has been seeking.

Patty called a special Social Justice Committee meeting. The committee decided to match members' donations to NATH up to \$500. Within minutes \$600 from members was pledged. The next day, the board approved the \$500 SJC donation. NATH confirmed our adoption of the men's bathroom, which Diane and Ron Reupert have been working on already.

We have just begun our journey with NATH. There is still a need for volunteer workers and further donations of money. Operation costs are estimated to be over \$200,000 per year. Residents will need and appreciate regular meals, transportation, mentoring, tutoring, and a host of other donations that we are able and hopefully willing to help provide.

Projects such as NATH are a perfect way to demonstrate social justice in action through our Social Justice Committee. We UUs must live our principles. We must walk the walk, not just talk the talk. We want to be that beacon of light in the Northwoods, and cause it to shine far and bright. How do YOU want the NUUF Social Justice Committee to support NATH?
