DISCUSSION GROUPS


Men's Discussion Group meets on Tuesday, March 10, at 6 p.m. at the Fellowship

PRESIDENT'S NOTE

From Randy Wendt:

Rather than trying to replicate what other movement organizations are already doing, the work of UU the Vote is to amplify the work already happening on the ground, equip each other with the skills and tools, and to channel resources to parts of the country where the imbalance between the work that is needed and the resources that are available is the greatest.

Make no mistake. Directly or indirectly, the issues so many of us care most deeply about—climate change, LGBTQ rights, immigration, racial justice and more—will be on the ballot in 2020.

UUs hold democracy and the right of all people to have a voice and a vote as part of our Seven Principles. The 2020 election cycle is a benchmark—not an endpoint—in our faith's long-term work toward justice. No matter the outcome this November, we have work to do to protect our faith's ability to stay relevant beyond 2020.

UU the Vote continues to build momentum in congregations around the country.

Last weekend, Forward Together: the UU Justice Ministry of North Carolina, gathered UUs for the Moral March on Raleigh with Rev. William Barber. Meanwhile, First Parish Brewster in Massachusetts recently gathered to write 119 letters and 153 postcards to voters in Florida, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin as part of a get-out-the-vote effort.

UU the Vote video

Unitarian Universalists have been part of every movement in US history, and we are ready to show up for the 2020 election like never before. Our forebears and ancestors gave us the blueprints for seeking justice in the world and speaking truth to power.

We're excited to share this short video that lifts up Francis Ellen Harper, the Unitarian who advocated as both a suffragist and an abolitionist, and Rev. James Reeb and Viola Liuzzo, two UUs killed during their work supporting the Civil Rights movement:

Share this 90-second video through your congregation's e-newsletter, website, or during worship service.

The general election is nine months away; but the critical work of UU the Vote starts now. In order to know how much we can scale up UU the Vote's activities for the critical work ahead, we need to know where our overall fundraising stands by the time we head into General Assembly in late June.

We're asking UU congregations to collectively raise \$300,000 for a UU the Vote State Action Fund, which will help us build out the state infrastructure, electoral technology, and on-the-ground organizing needed to make a difference in the 2020 election cycle.

The State Action Fund will better position us to protect reproductive rights, voting rights, or other liberties, and to mobilize support to areas where progressive measures (e.g., \$15/hour living wage in Florida) will be on the ballot.

Congregational support building

The UU the Vote State Action Fund received its first contribution recently from a collection held by the First Unitarian Church of Dallas. Other congregations that have made early commitments to the state action fund include:

Can you let the UU the Vote Team know your congregation's fundraising plans, even if it's an estimate? Just as in congregational life, this will help us plan our fall strategy.

Sunday, March 1, 2020, the weekend before Super Tuesday, UU the Vote is sponsoring a nationwide Giving Day. A step-by-step guide to fundraising for UU the Vote is included in the organizing toolkit (PDF), and is available online at <u>uuthevote.org</u>. You can download sample newsletter and collection announcements, as well as a newly posted sample collection script.

Even if March 1 collection doesn't go toward UU the Vote, we're asking congregations to read a short announcement inviting members to pledge a mobile gift to the UU the Vote State Action Fund—by texting VOTELOVE to 91999. Whatever is donated via text-to-give will be counted toward the congregation's overall state action fund contribution.
