- **Voting Information:** To protect your ability to vote, apply online for an absentee ballot through April 2. The choice is yours, you can select all or select certain elections to receive absentee ballots for in 2020.

If you are NOT a registered voter, you must first REGISTER TO VOTE, which can be completed ONLINE through today March 18 IF you have the proper proof of residence and proof of identity to be scanned. To Register to Vote after March 18, you must go in person to your clerk.

Before starting the online process – if you do NOT have a driver’s license on file with your town or city clerk, Scan your driver’s license either as a PDF or .JPEG. (Or take a picture of license with cell phone and send to yourself and save in your computer for attachment when directed to do so in the process)

After scanning your license so ready to attach, begin the online application at <http://myvote.wi.gov>
