## From the President

For the first time since I became a member of the Northwoods UU Fellowship, the UUA has a new leader. After a spirited campaign, Golden Colorado minister Rev. Peter Morales defeated Rev. Laurel Hallman of Dallas at the General Assembly meetings in Salt Lake City last month. Past President William Sinkford was known for his strong stands on peace and justice issues. While Rev. Morales will certainly not ignore these, his campaign stressed the need to grow the numbers of our denomination.

Although membership in Unitarian Universalist churches and fellowships has grown steadily since the 1980s, it is still below where it was in the mid 1960s. According to the 2007 Pew Survey on Religion and Public Life, only about .7% of adults report their religious affiliation as Unitarian Universalist. This is about the same as the number reported for Buddhists, and only slightly higher than those affiliated with the Islamic religious tradition. Clearly, Rev. Morales has a challenging task ahead as he works to expand the denomination in a time of generally weakening religious interest.

Meanwhile, here in the Northwoods, summer is in full swing with many visitors coming and going. If you have out-of-town guests, they will surely be interested in hearing a first-hand report on events in the Middle East. On July 23 the Social Justice Committee is sponsoring a talk by our own Elaine Strite, who is returning from Lebanon for a brief visit. You won't want to miss her presentation, which is titled "Perceptions of the Middle East: Working in Egypt and the Levant." The event begins at 7:00 p.m. at the Fellowship.

And, at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, July 31<sup>st</sup>, Jerry Buerer will present an overview of Darwin's religious attitudes in a lecture titled, "The Religious Evolution of Chuckie D."

One of our goals for this year is to improve communication between the Board, the committees, and the congregation. ### Stewardship of the Forest

This in from Jeff Niese: Is your forest a "Living Legacy?" Find out on Saturday, August

1<sup>st</sup>.

There is a modest registration fee for the program. Being a good steward is especially important when it comes to the private forestlands of Wisconsin. Why? Because the majority of Wisconsin's forests are managed by private individual landowners, and most of these owners are over 55 years old. Perhaps you or someone you know owns a piece of forest land, and is concerned about how to plan for its future.

A timely workshop entitled **“Estate Planning for Forest Landowners—Your Living Legacy”**, is scheduled for Saturday, August 1<sup>st</sup> at Trees for Tomorrow in Eagle River. The program will start at 8:30 am and run through lunch. Three expert speakers—including a prominent estate attorney, a forest specialist, and a land protection expert will be available to help answer landowner questions. A panel of experienced landowners will also share what they have learned on their respective land protection journeys. The workshop is being sponsored by “Partners In Forestry”, a forest landowner cooperative.

If you have questions like these about your land, plan to attend on August 1<sup>st</sup>:

- How can I better protect our family's land assets?
- How can we provide for changes in our family's goals?
- How do proposed changes in estate and tax laws affect us?
- What tools are available to protect our land?
- How do conservation easements work?
- What role do land trusts play in conserving lands?
- Can I talk with some experts on my concerns without breaking the bank?

Don't miss this workshop, and please bring a friend or family member who needs to learn more about land protection and estate planning strategies. Perhaps most singular is the tendency of her poems to be at once powerful and appealing, an affection for the natural world and a
