From the President

This year at the General Assembly in Salt Lake City the UUA announced the “Standing on

the Side of Love” public advocacy campaign. SSL, or “Sizzle” as it has come to be known, is based on our first principle—promoting respect for the inherent worth and dignity of every person. Prompted by the attack on the Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Church in Knoxville in July 2008, the initiative will try and accomplish two goals: carry our message of inherent worth and dignity to a broader audience, and mobilize quick and effective responses to incidents of exclusion, oppression or violence based on intolerance of people’s identities. Thanks to Tom and Elinore Sommerfeld, we have a local connection to this campaign. This summer, organizers hung a large “Standing on the Side of Love Banner” from the Salt Palace Tower to welcome this year’s GA delegates. About midway through the convention, a strong thunderstorm with high winds ripped the banner down. The banner was cut up and distributed at the close of the convention, and Tom and Elinore were able to obtain a section. They had it framed and presented it to the Fellowship at the 20th Anniversary Celebration. It will be displayed in the Founder’s room along with an explanation of its significance.

As UU’s we can be proud that our denomination has taken such a forthright stand in favor of inclusion, equality, peace, and justice for all. We should look for opportunities to join with other like-minded members of our community who share our belief in the inherent worth and dignity of all, and be quick to respond when individuals and groups are marginalized or attacked on the basis of their social identity. “Sizzle” is an idea that is too good to keep to ourselves. Spread the word.

KIDS AGAINST HUNGER Food Packing Event

The United Nations World Health Organization reports that every day more than 40,000 children die from starvation and diseases caused by hunger. Incredibly, one child dies every five seconds from starvation, 12 children every minute, hour after hour, day after day. More than 6 million children under the age of 5 die every year from hunger.

On October 31 the Lakeland community will team up with non-profit organization "Kids Against Hunger" to package meals for hungry children in the United States and around the world. Our goal is to package 100,000 meals in three hours. Each meal will cost only 15 cents! Here's where you come in: to make 100,000 meals for hungry children we need to raise \$15,000 and sign-up 450 volunteers to work 90-minute shifts at the Lakeland Union High School cafeteria, from 9:00 to 10:30 a.m. and 10:30 to 12:00 a.m. Nationally, Kids Against Hunger volunteers packaged nearly 40 million meals last year that were distributed in more than 40 countries.

Our NUUF Social Justice Committee has generously committed \$1,000 to this event including \$723 raised at the Spring Fling fund raiser. On October 11th and 25th we will have a table in the Founders Room for anyone who wishes to sign up to help and/or contribute money. Donations can also be mailed to Kids Against Hunger, P.O.
